
# Family home activity sheet for older children

Our security guards wore this badge in 1939 as part of their uniform. It has the figure of Britannia — she is a Roman goddess and the symbol of the Bank. You can find Britannia

on our banknotes. People today wear badges or uniforms so we can tell what they do for a living.

This candle holder is from the late 1600s. It was used by people who lived in the area before the Bank of England was built here. An archaeologist dug it up during


building work in the 1920s. Candles were used before we had electricity.




This is a picture of Sarah Whitehead, who often visited the Bank. She became known as the 'Bank Nun' because she wore the same black clothes every day.









This is a pinwheel calculator that was used by Bank staff between 1920 and 1965. It is a mechanical calculator — you have to turn the gear wheels to enter the number for calculation, instead of pressing buttons.
